Guelph Arts Council Announces Fall Exhibitions

Guelph, ON – **November 19, 2020** – Guelph Arts Council's Fall 2020 programming includes the Guelph Emerging Artist Mentorship Project's culminating exhibition at Boarding House Gallery, *Lonely Together*, as well as three exhibitions at 10C Shared Space in November and December.

Lonely Together is an initiative of the Guelph Emerging Artist Mentorship Project's Fall 2020 round. It features the work of emerging visual/media artists Aurora Black, Paige Bromby, James Cooper, Christine De Vuono, Daytona Hack, Maeve Hind, Maria Ibarra, and Nancy MacNabb; emerging musicians Silas Chinsen and Tiffany Ratsizafy; and emerging cultural managers Paige Bromby and Tatiana Poluch. Guelph Arts Council and the participants of the Guelph Emerging Artist Mentorship Project invite the public to join them for an online closing celebration of the exhibition on Thursday, November 26 from 6 - 7 pm. The online reception will include live music and a facilitated Q&A with the participants.

Visitors can see the exhibition at Boarding House Gallery, 6 Dublin St. S during open hours, Tuesday – Sunday, 12 – 5pm. For any visitors wishing to speak to a participant of the program about the art, music, or the program, a representative will be attending the gallery on Saturdays and Sundays 12 – 5pm.

Megan Sanderson will showcase paintings and mixed media work from **November 26-December 11**. Megan's work takes inspiration from independent research done on algue found on the southern New Brunswick coastline.









Maureen Ault's exhibition runs **December 12-31**. Inspired by the simplicity and folk art of Maud E. Lewis and Grandma Moses, Ault's work uses pressed botanical materials to reflect themes of movement, detail and texture while telling stories with a touch of humour.
